Current event reports may *not* **cover sports or celebrities.** They should relate to local, state, national, or international relations, politics, policies, or events. You may use any print news source (or related internet site) for your story. You need to complete the three sections on this side and on the back in order to receive full credit for your current event report. You do not need to attach the actual piece of news.
